The Lloyd to Woodlawn Neighborhood Greenway is a NE 9th Ave Neighborhood Greenway route and a Safer 7th Avenue.


The project will reduce conflict between users, improve safety for everyone, and establish a low stress walking and biking route connecting the Woodlawn, Vernon, Sabin, King, Irvington neighborhoods to the Lloyd neighborhood and the future Sullivan's Crossing bridge.

- Crossing enhancements will provide safer street crossings of busy streets for people walking and biking. This includes Safe Routes to School crossings.
- **Traffic diverters** will reduce traffic volumes where the level of traffic is too high.
- Create and maintain low speed conditions along NE Ninth Ave with speed humps.
- A future bicycle path will connect through Irving Park. A route through Irving Park is currently not surveyed, designed or funded. When capacity permits, PBOT and Portland Parks & Recreation will explore funding for a route that minimizes impacts to park users.

A Safer 7th Avenue

The full length of NE Seventh Avenue will receive design changes to reduce conflict and improve safety, particularly where children and pedestrians concentrate. No traffic pattern changes are proposed.

Key Project Elements:

- **Reduce illegal speeding** with speed humps, markings, and parking adjustments.
- **Reduce conflict** through the removal of some existing traffic circles.
- Enhance safety at crossings for schools and areas with high levels of pedestrian activity.
- Enhance crossings for neighborhood greenways at NE Going St, NE Morris St, NE Tillamook St, using crossing signs, markings, and stop sign adjustments.
- Enhance safety for people bicycling along NE Seventh using signs and markings to reduce conflict and increase safety.
- **Bike lane connection** from NE Tillamook to NE Weidler street will establish a complete connection to the Sullivan's Crossing Bridge.



Public Outreach

Portland Bureau of Transportation staff have talked with hundreds of community members to date since the project start in February 2018. The project recommendation is a result of deep community involvement including a broad array of stakeholders and designed to understand the opportunities and challenges of the streets under consideration. This involvement directly influenced the recommended route and design, to identify a project with broad community support.

Public Meetings & Community Events

Throughout the process the project team met with area businesses, neighborhood associations, attended community events, and hosted multiple in-person open houses and tabling events.
